### “Dragon” Brigade Soldier honored with Silver Star

JUNCTION CITY – During the 1st Infantry Division Ball May 8 inside the Marriott’s ballroom, a mortarman with Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 2nd Battalion, 16th Infantry Regiment, 4th Infantry Brigade Combat Team received the Silver Star.

Sgt. Jared D. Gilmore, a native of Ruston, La., received the third highest military decoration for his actions in support of Operation Enduring Freedom while he served with the 2nd Battalion (Airborne), 503rd Infantry Regiment, 173rd Airborne Brigade.

While setting up a vehicle patrol base inside a small village in Afghanistan, the area where Gilmore and his platoon were emplaced came under attack by a group of insurgents using rocket propelled grenades. During the attack, the platoon’s observation post and mortar pit was struck. As a result, Gilmore and other Soldiers from the platoon

## Baghdad neighborhood responds to the positive efforts of the ‘Daggers’

BAGHDAD – In the past year, a neighborhood in northwest Baghdad has overcome sectarian violence and seen vast improvements in security, essential services and civil capacity.

The Iraqi media saw first-hand May 11 that, through partnership with the local government, Iraqi security forces and the 1st Combined Arms Battalion, 18th Infantry Regiment, 2nd Heavy Brigade Combat Team, 1st Infantry Division, citizens of the Hurriyah neighborhood of northwest Baghdad are witnessing an improvement in their community.

In a walk-through of a busy market street, various Iraqi television stations met with civic, tribal and security leaders, as well as 2nd HBCT leaders, and saw a cleaner environment and thriving shops.

“We’re trying to show the people of Hurriyah, the people who live outside of Hurriyah and throughout Baghdad, the security, civic and essential service im-

provements in Hurriyah,” said Capt. Nathan Williams, a native of Raleigh, N.C., and commander of Company A, 1st Bn., 18th Inf. Regt.

“There are a lot of misconceptions out there that the area hasn’t been prospering recently. We’re trying to spread the word that things have improved so people can come back to Hurriyah.”

Because the word came from the neighborhood’s leaders and the local media, it is likely the people of Iraq will find Hurriyah’s improvements more credible.

Williams added that the population of Hurriyah also sees street sweepers cleaning up trash and much of the sewage from the past has been removed.

quickly responded by re-establishing and re-securing the observation post and pushing the insurgents back.

As he remembered and revealed his thoughts on receiving the award, Gilmore remained humble by saying, "I was just a part of the team."

The Silver Star is awarded to a person who, while serving in any capacity with the U.S. Army, is cited for gallantry in action against an enemy of the United States while engaged in military operations involving conflict with an opposing foreign force, or while serving with friendly foreign forces engaged in armed conflict against an opposing armed force.

### 1st ID assets to support 65th D-Day Anniversary in Abilene

The Combat Aviation Brigade, the Commanding General's Mounted Color Guard and the 1st ID Marching Band, are scheduled to participate with the Eisenhower Presidential Library and Museum to mark the 65th anniversary of D-Day on June 5-7.

# Purple Heart awarded to wounded WTB Soldier

*Sgt. Jerad Gough of Idaho survived head injuries and looks to return to duty*

A Warrior Transition Battalion Soldier received a Purple Heart May 5 at the WTB town hall meeting. Col. Howard "Lee" Merritt and Sgt. Maj. Timothy Ricks of the WTB presented Sgt. Jerad Gough with the Purple Heart.

Originally from Gooding, Idaho, Gough was assigned to Fort Riley for his second deployment. Gough suffered head injuries in a roadside attack Dec. 14, 2008, in Iraq while serving with the 5th Squadron, 4th Cavalry Regiment, 2nd Heavy Brigade Combat Team, 1st Infantry Division.

Gough and three other Soldiers were struck by roadside grenades and enemy small arms fire. "We pushed through the kill zone to assess our injuries and triage ourselves," Gough recalled. "Luckily one of the wounded Soldiers

was a medic and despite his injuries was able to prioritize emergency treatment for the rest of us," Gough said, adding he felt fortunate they escaped with limbs intact.

Gough said he plans to reintegrate back into his unit and continue his career as an infantry mortarman in June. For now he is recovering with the WTB.

The Purple Heart is a combat decoration awarded to members of the armed forces who were wounded or killed while protecting the U.S. and defending its freedoms. As he received the award, Gough said, "This was not an award I aspired to receive, but it is nice to be a part of the Purple Heart Society (association)."

IACH and TriWest offer mail order and express scripts refill options.

The mail order service expedites prescription processing and allows people to manage their prescriptions on-line from their homes, 24-hours per day.

The prescriptions are delivered by mail to the patients' residence. These services are frequently used by Soldiers while deployed.

Non-active duty patients incur a \$3 co-payment for generic drugs and \$9 for name-brand prescriptions. There are no co-payment fees for active duty Soldiers.
